5. A. True. Wolves can go for days without eating and when they do get a meal, they really "wolf it down." They can eat up to 9 kilograms of meat at one time. That's like an entire turkey!
6. A. There are three species of wolves in the world. The other two are the Red Wolf and the Ethiopian Wolf.
7. C. The Alpha male and female are the leaders in a wolf pack and are the only two that will become parents. The other wolves in the pack help raise the pups.
8. B. A wolf can live up to 15 years in captivity.
9. A. True. Normal, healthy wild wolves have never killed a person in North America. In fairytales, wolves have been a symbol of evil for a long time, and many people still shoot or poison them out of fear. The truth is, there are no "big bad wolves".
10. B. Wolves benefit other animals by providing food for them. The carcasses of wolf kills provide food for other animals. In the winter, eagles and coyotes survive by eating wolf leftovers.
