1. Rain or snow contaminated by industrial chemicals such as nitrogen and sulfur. (2 words)
2. An organism that regulates its body temperature, getting heat from outside sources.
3. Two parallel ridges in frogs and toads that run down the sides of the back. (2 words)
4. Organisms (bacterial, viral, or fungus) that can cause disease in the host animal.
5. Mobile black pigment cells in the skin of frogs and other animals.
7. Any animal without a spinal cord (i.e.: insects, worms, mollusks, sponges).
9. An animal with moist, smooth skin that lays eggs without a hard shell (i.e.: frogs, toads, salamanders).
10. A barrier that is easily crossed or penetrated.
11. The act of sexual reproduction.
12. A primitive group of plants, mainly found in the water, without true leaves, stems or roots.
